

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
The Mad, Mad Murders of Marigold Way



It takes place in a stereotypical American suburb, on a familiar American street, not too far northwest—but far enough—from a major American metropolitan center, Chicago, Illinois. For our purposes, we'll call our suburb Lincoln Grove, although its name, as well as the names of the characters involved, have been changed to protect... oh, I don't know. Changing names isn't going to protect anyone.

Our story is set in May of 2020. Since March of 2020, the occupants of Lincoln Grove have been hunkering down, dealing with the pandemic in their own way. They're keeping the kids home, working out of their living rooms or bedrooms via computers, toiling in their yards, taking walks or riding bicycles for exercise, and avoiding their neighbors except to speak occasionally while standing at least six feet apart and perhaps wearing masks. No one dons masks when out walking—the paths are never crowded.

I suppose the most significant thing about the neighborhood is that no one on the horseshoe has gotten sick. Most everyone has worked to keep safe and practice social distancing. Still, one can almost taste the paranoia and mistrust in the air. Fear of the virus is tangible. Jokes about toilet paper hoarding have long passed. The residents of Lincoln Grove attempt to stay chipper and keep a positive attitude, but there is no question that every person is on edge.

I'm sure you know what I'm talking about.

And this is where our little murder tale commences.



Interview Questions

What inspired this book?

It was May 2020 and my wife and I were in lockdown at home with Covid-19 raging outside. At that time, no one knew what the future would hold. There was no vaccine in sight, and there was still so much that was unknown about the virus. The geographical environment in the story mirrors where we were living (fictionalized, but yes, we live on a street not unlike "Marigold Way" and in a town very much like "Lincoln Grove"!). For months prior to the pandemic, and during it, the house next door to ours was for sale. It took a long time to sell it—not sure why. As with most writers, my imagination, fueled by the fever dream of the paranoia and bizarre life we were leading during the lockdown, took off and created a strange back story for that unsold house... and the story grew from there. The book was written over the next two to three months.

What reservations, if any, did you have about setting the book during the pandemic?

I had no reservations at all. History is history. Especially now, two years later, the pandemic is a part of the world's timeline and it can't be ignored. I, for one, will have trouble buying into any novels or movies or TV shows that supposedly take place recently or "now" that do not acknowledge in some way that we've been through a pandemic.

What is the message in the book, if any, that pertains to the pandemic?

The book really isn't about the pandemic. It's merely the backdrop, the "special world" of the story that informs how the characters behave. When one is frightened, paranoid, and uncertain about the future, a person might do some crazy things. The book is about some of those crazy things.

How much of the book mirrors your own mental state during the first few months of Covid?

I would say my existence was pretty close to the protagonist's (Scott Hatcher) daily life—staying home, going for walks, social distancing, wearing masks at the grocery store and such—but I certainly am not as stupid as he is! Being happily married, I was not in the rather shattered mental state that encourages him do the irrational and impulsive things that push the story forward.

Why and how is this book NOT about the pandemic?

Perhaps it's more about the hidden underside of suburbia and the dark recesses of the human heart. There is a labyrinth of a mystery that is the backbone of the novel, but it is placed against the larger Mystery of Life itself, all with a touch of down-home humor.



Interview Questions (cont.)

What is your writing process?

There are "Plotters" and "Pantsers." Plotters outline/plan out the novel in advance of writing, and Pantsers just sit down and write by the "seat of the pants." I'm the former. Being trained in theatre, I was taught to prepare-prepare. I look at the process as "building" a novel, and to do that one must have the blueprints. I carefully plan out the story in a prose treatment. This is the most difficult phase of the process for me, for I work out all the red herrings and twists and turns. It doesn't mean I'm married to it, for it can be flexible during the writing phase. But it's a guide, a map. When I'm writing, I attempt to complete a scene a day. That scene must have a beginning and end, so it can be two pages long or it can be twenty. I don't look back at what I've written until the entire first draft is finished. This constant moving-forward in the initial draft establishes a pace. Once the first draft is done, then I go back and rewrite, and that part is the most fun!

Besides writing, what has helped you get through the pandemic?

I read a lot, not only new works, but I re-read some of my favorites. All of lan Fleming's Bond novels, Neil Gaiman's The Sandman series... I rewatched dozens of favorite films and binged on new (for me) television series... My wife and I like to walk, so we did a lot of that when the weather was nice. And we cooked a lot... we're both good cooks, so we made each meal, especially dinner, an "event" with candlelight—every night.

You have a background in theater and film history—how have these influenced your writing?

There's an old adage that people with degrees in theatre can do anything. That may sound facetious, but in many ways, it's true. In theatre we're taught to think abstractly, to collaborate with a team, and to work against a deadline and meet it (that opening night date can't be budged!). We also learn about stagecraft, lighting, design, and dramaturgy. As a directing major, I was taught to analyze the text and break it down beat by beat long before the first rehearsal. Prepare-prepareprepare! As a film historian—and film lover—I have embraced all kinds of filmmaking, both domestic and foreign, and have deep-dived into eclectic and non-mainstream works, as well as commercial cinema. When one is well-versed in the arts, one is well-served as an artist.

Your first novels were James Bond stories, but you've moved far away from that genre in subject matter —why are your original novels so eclectic?

I suppose I never really wanted to be tied down to a series of my own...Perhaps I feel about my writing the way some filmmakers think of their films—they tackle different subject matter, but their style and themes might always be present. My "brand" is the style and themes and milieu of what can be called a "Raymond Benson book."
